Executive Director Message

2022 Return to Palestine and Israel

In 2022 we finally resumed travel to the Holy Land. How wonderful it was to connect and reconnect with the many people and organizations with whom we partner to support our mission to foster a just peace for all in Palestine and Israel through education.

I had the opportunity to visit with Abuna Chacour and the schools that comprise Mar Elias Educational Institutions (MEEI). I met so many wonderful teachers, students, administrators, and board members (General Assembly).

My heart was warmed by the breadth and depth of passionate, dedicated, and committed people at every level. Clearly Mar Elias is in a category all its own. I asked everyone I met what they loved about MEEI. Without exception I heard repeatedly that MEEI feels not only like a school but like a family where each member truly cares about the well-being of the others - and appreciates the differences — as students and teachers arrive at the school from near and far.

I didn't truly grasp what makes MEEI so special until this visit — most schools in Palestinian villages are not mixed (including students and teachers from different religions and villages) the way MEEI is and the students choose MEEI for that reason — they desire expanding beyond the confines of their villages, not to mention that MEEI also has such a strong reputation across the country for preparing students to succeed post High School.

I was continually moved by stories from teachers who go above and beyond (some driving nearly 3 hours per day to work at MEEI) because being a part of MEEI is so rewarding.

I also had the opportunity to visit other Peace Partners in Palestine: Wi'am, Hope School, Seraj, Dar al Kalima (Diyar football for girls) and Father Firas in Zababdeh. All of which moved me deeply by the incredible contributions they offer to their communities. I am very honored to play even a small role in their ability to do critically important work in service to improving the lives of Palestinians and fostering a just peace.

Your donations and support over several decades have made an indelible impact upon a thriving and unique Mar Elias and much needed help for so many in Palestine via our Peace Partners; I offer a deep bow to you. aniteg bri

MEEI Named Top School in Israel

The entire family of MEEI was so thrilled to learn that Mar Elias High School was chosen as one of the top schools, out of 351 high schools, in Israel.

The Ministry of Education published the list of the high schools that excelled in the values, social and academic fields in the past school year. The schools were selected according to the degree of success and improvement rates in a series of indicators, including: matriculation eligibility rate, dropout prevention, and admission of special education students.

Mar Elias was named at the highest ranking level, again.

Biggest Needs at MEEI

Because the Ministry of Education funds Palestinian schools at a considerably lower rate than the Jewish counterparts, there's never any shortage of needs to keep MEEI an exceptional educational institution. This list captures some of the more pressing needs felt by administrators, faculty and students alike:

- Scholarship support for upwards of 65% of students is essential as families continue to struggle post-pandemic.
- Counseling room in the Elementary School that would offer support in a space that is calm and peaceful allowing students to share about the everyday stress they face.
- Academic Learning 'Pods' in the Elementary School where students can both build upon lessons in the classroom in fun and engaging ways to support their learning and challenge them further. This is especially important in the ongoing pandemic education reality where many students have missed consistent in-person learning.
- Alumni Relations staff position to work with MEEI alumni throughout the world to build a network and community of the thousands who have walked through the doors of MEEI.
- Indoor/outdoor sporting space for all weather conditions - currently the play areas are sub-par and do not encourage student engagement due to the harsh weather conditions either in the summer or winter months.
- Green spaces, shaded areas, and areas for connection and

conversation on the MEEI main campus. It is important for the well-being of all students to have these accommodations that grow and sustain communities. An initial \$20,000 investment for installation of gardens and shaded areas due to the sweltering summer temperatures, with an ongoing maintenance budget of \$20,000 each year would be most beneficial.

Building maintenance to repair retaining walls and upgrade doors, floors, and walls in aging school buildings.





Students Visit Ireland


Thirty-four students (ages 14-16) from Mar Elias Educational Institutions (MEEI) visited Derry in Northern Ireland in August 2022.

Mar Elias Junior: Outstanding Mountain Biker

From a Haaretz article: In Shfar'am, a revolution is taking place in the field of riding. Much thanks to an ambitious 16-year-old Munira Yassin started mountain biking only a year and a half ago, but has already achieved a lot of things. Her success is the vision that stood before the eyes of Mohammed Subuh, founder of the Shfaram Sports Association: "I want to see more riders like her"

> On the face of it, it seems that the agenda of Munira Yassin from Shfar'am is no different from that of any girl her age: she wakes up every morning around 6:00 A.M., tries to get organized quickly, and goes to the Mar Elias High School in the village of I'billin.

The day before yesterday, she finished 10th grade in the school's gifted class, and these days she is still debating what will be the subjects she will choose to deepen her studies in ("On the one hand, I am very interested in psychology, but biotechnology and the environment also attract me. I'm a little nervous because I have to decide soon"). In the afternoons, she meets up with friends and talks to her mother ("my best friend"), and spends the rest of her free time reading ("I really like reading history books. I don't know why, it excites me").

Why Pilgrims is Critical to the **Success of Mar Elias**

MEEI is a special school whereby students from different religious backgrounds study together on campus to change their reality and society atlarge. Unlike many schools for Palestinian students in Israel, the vast majority of MEEI graduates go on to higher education. By test scores they rank among the ten best high schools in Israel, compared to ALL other schools -Jewish or Arab.

While MEEI does receive funding from the Israeli government, because education is federally funded rather than locally funded in Israel, the money they get is limited to paying for teacher salaries, at a minimum wage and a limited number of hours per week.

There are absolutely students at Mar Elias who would not attend a decent high school, if not for scholarships given through Pilgrims of Ibillin.




Like all schools for Palestinian children within the Israeli school system, they do not receive scholarship funds.

Further, Mar Elias gets no tax money to help pay for buildings, maintenance, curriculum, or educational equipment and technology. (Jewish schools, on the other hand, do get funding for these sorts of expenses.) That's why support from Pilgrims of Ibillin has been so critically important over many years. Wi'am — The Palestinian Conflict **Transformation Center**

Wi'am seeks to address the whole family as a unit, emphasizing work with women, youth, and children, in order to bring about more holistic and sustainable change.

Both our youth and women's groups are meeting throughout the summer.

Recently our women's group went on trips to Abu Ghosh, Latrun, and the beach in Jaffa. It is important not only to visit other places and learn more about the country, but also to spend time in nature and to have experiences that allow people to release stress and other pent-up emotions.

Summer Camp

With a similar goal, Wi'am

held an annual summer camp including about 60 kids to play games, make art, swim, and practice some Dabke. Campers develop valuable social skills and un-

leash their creative potential as they participate in group and individual activities.

Fostering a just

English Classes

Separate from the camp, Wi'am also hosts English classes for a number of students, learning grammar and vocabulary through lessons and interactive review games.

Wi'am also facilitates many mediations, as conflicts in the community arise. Over the past season, staff attended several conferences, workshops, speaking events, and panels, networking with women and human rights organizations in order to expand our networks and to become better equipped to serve the community.

Wi'am also continues to host visiting groups of all sizes, to encourage others through our work and to talk about the sociopolitical and economic situation in Palestine, and the conditions Palestinians face every day. Some of our groups come to discuss over coffee, while others we have taken on trips to Hebron, the Tent of Nations just outside of Bethlehem, other beautiful natural spaces, or the refugee camp. We greatly enjoy getting to share with these groups, and seeing people from all around the world who are trying to pursue justice and peace.






Peace Partner Updates continue

New library and storytelling center in Kufor Aqab






A child birthday celebration

In partnership with Hope School, Taghyeer conducted an eight-day capacity-building training course targeting social leaders, teachers, and mentors to enhance their leadership skills in addressing violent incidents.

Three of our staff along with 17 youth leaders from Bethlehem and Hebron areas participated in the workshop. Tula, the school deputy, confirmed that the workshop represented an added value in introducing up-to-date awareness and techniques in mediation, conflict resolution and enhancing peaceful values among children.

"It was great to get to know new concepts, idioms, and techniques on how to absorb the anger of our children" she quoted.

Fostering a just peace

Maia Water Project in Gaza

There is a growing water crisis in Palestine. In Gaza, 97% of water is unfit for human consumption. Numerous military attacks on the Gaza Strip have devastated Gaza's water infrastructure and the siege of Gaza has created a shortage of pipes, building materials, fuel and electricity. The water in Gaza is polluted with untreated sewage, agricultural chemicals, and it is brackish from seawater. Gaza's water crisis poses grave health risks to children.



In September 2009, the Middle East Children's Alliance (MECA) responded to this crisis by launching the Maia Project (Arabic for "water") to provide Palestinian children with clean, safe drinking water by installing water purification and desalination units in schools throughout the Gaza Strip.

Pilgrims of Ibillin is proud to be part of the effort that has successfully provided over 90,000 children with safe and clean drinking water in Gaza.

This year we held our first Living Stones Pilgrimage to the Holy Land in over 3 years! How wonderful it was to return and spend time with so many old friends while making new connections too.

Pilgrims shared their impressions each day in the **Living Stones Pilgrimage blog**.

Here's a sample:

From Brenda Mehos, Pilgrimage Coordinator

We started off today visiting a farm called the Tent of Nations near Bethlehem. The Nassars recently celebrated 105 years on their land. Their 100 acres in the West Bank is now surrounded by 5 illegal settlements (by International Law) and in fact their farm is the only hilltop in the area without a settlement on it.



They have olive and fruit trees, grapes, and they have chickens and goats as well. They have met incredible challenges to hold onto their land. They have unfortunately had physical attacks, destroyed roads, and destroyed olive and fruit trees, but they've persevered by inviting people to visit and volunteer for planting and harvesting.

The dry climate makes it incredibly challenging to replace lost trees and they are denied water and electricity, but they've thrived in spite of it by employing sustainable practices to preserve the environment. Daoud Nassar told us they refuse to hate, they refuse to be enemies, and they are challenged daily. He believes in standing up for what is unjust and their Christian faith is their center.
